# **Hashimotos Thyroiditis**

### What is your thyroid gland and what does it do?

The thyroid is a small gland in the front of the neck just below the voice box (larynx) it is made up of two parts or lobes. Its most important function is the regulation of your body's metabolism.

#### What is hashimotos thyroiditis?

It is a disease of the thyroid. It is an autoimmune disorder that occurs when the immune system attacks and destroys the thyroid gland. This leads to insufficient production of thyroxine. It is the most common form of hypothyroidism. It is most common in middle-aged women.

#### Symptoms

Many people go for years without symptoms or they are that subtle that they can often be mistaken for depression.

The most common symptoms are fatigue, sensitivity to cold, muscle weakness, constipation and sometimes a goitre.

A goitre is an enlargement of the thyroid gland. Sometimes, early on in the disease process, the thyroid seems to be stimulated and people are hot and have palpitations (overactive thyroid). This almost always changes to an under active thyroid (hypothyroidism) over a period of time.

#### Is it hereditary?

There is evidence that supports it being a hereditary disorder, especially if autoimmune diseases run in the family e.g. overactive thyroid, diabetes and rheumatoid arthritis.

#### Investigations

Usually consist of blood tests – thyroid antibodies and thyroid function tests. If you have goitre you may be sent for an ultrasound of your thyroid as well.

#### Treatment.

The hypothyroidism resulting form Hashimotos thyroiditis will be treated with tablets called levothyroxine (please see separate information leaflet). You will need regular blood tests to check the levels of thyroxine and you may occasionally need to increase the dose, these will need to be taken for life.

It may take some time at first to get the dose of thyroxine correct. If you have not developed hypothyroidism with your Hashimotos thyroiditis the management will be regular observation and blood tests with your family doctor (G.P.)
