

Mouthpiece Ventilation (MPV) For use with Non-Invasive Ventilation (NIV)



Therapies Department

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What is MPV?

MPV is a treatment which provides short periods of ventilation throughout the day, without the requirement to wear your NIV mask.

What is it used for?

MPV is useful to people who benefit from ventilation throughout the day to enable them to continue their usual daily work or social activities.

Where only short periods of day time ventilation are needed, MPV offers an alternative to putting on the NIV mask.

If you are unsure about the reason why you have been given MPV please ask the doctor or physiotherapist.



MPV can be attached to any secure surface such as a table top, and is shown above attached to a wheelchair.

Will I be seen by a Doctor, Nurse or Physiotherapist?

The whole medical team is involved in your care.

You will be assessed to determine your need for MPV by the clinical team.

If you are an inpatient you may be offered MPV during your stay.

If you are an outpatient, will be invited to an outpatient appointment which may last up to two hours when MPV is ready for collection.

If a second outpatient visit is needed your physiotherapist will arrange this with you.

During the MPV trial you will have a full explanation about MPV and how to use it.

You will also receive a list of contact numbers should you have any queries.

When is MPV used?

This device can remain in standby when you are inside or outside your home and should enable you to continue daily and social activities, without having to return to the NIV mask for periods of ventilation.

If the ventilator is not in use please turn it off.

How do I use it?

The MPV arm can be attached to a stable surface or to your wheelchair.

MPV will remain in a 'standby' mode ready use which means it is not blowing.



Choosing MPV mode:

When MPV is in use the Trilogy ventilator operates in a different mode than you currently use at night.

Once your ventilator is turned on, you can change your ventilator to the MPV mode following these steps:

- Use the arrow up button in the centre of the screen to open the 'menu'
- 'Switch to Secondary settings' should be highlighted in a grey box
- 3. Choose 'select'



- 4. The device will then display 'Switch to Secondary Settings?'
- 5. Choose 'Yes'
- 6. Choose 'Exit' to return to the main screen

Image above shows 'Switch to secondary settings' option highlighted and ready to select.

To return the Trilogy to your usual night mode follow the same method but select 'Switch to Primary Settings'.

Can I use oxygen with MPV?

If you use nasal cannula during the day time you can leave these in place whilst using MPV.

What equipment will I be given?

- Trilogy Ventilator
- Mouthpiece / straw
- MPV arm
- Tubing
- Filters
- 'In-use' bag

Ventilator:

Currently we are only able to provide mouthpiece ventilation in the form described in this leaflet via the Trilogy 100 ventilator which you will also be using at night.

The ventilation team may decide to provide you with two ventilators and will discuss this with you if needed.

Mouthpiece:

There are two options of mouthpiece as seen below.

Not everyone can manage the straw option, as it can be difficult to seal your lips around it.

MPV arm:

There are a few types of MPV arm which will look similar to the picture below, and will attach to a surface or wheelchair using a vice.

'In-use' bag:

Your Trilogy ventilator can be attached to the back of your wheelchair using an 'inuse' bag.

If you would like to use MPV whilst in your wheelchair please ask your physiotherapist for one of these bags.

Humidification:

It is not possible to use humidification with the MPV circuit.

Information about cleaning my equipment

MPV arm:

Wipe over the MPV arm with a damp cloth weekly and leave to air dry.

Mouthpiece:

Please clean the short mouthpiece or straw every 2-3 days with warm soapy water and allow to air dry.

Filters:

The bacterial filter used with the MPV circuit should be changed 6-12 monthly.

If it is visibly soiled it is acceptable to change the filter as required.

Tubing:

The tubing should be changed every 6 months.

It is not required to wash the tubing as you do not breathe out in to the tubing.

Exhalation valve:

There is no exhalation valve in the MPV circuit as you do not breathe out in to the mouth piece

When travelling with your ventilator:

Ventilator users that are deemed to be ventilator dependant should already have two ventilators with batteries.

You should discuss your level of dependency with your ventilation team.

Anyone who is unable to safely miss a night of NIV treatment should take away at least one spare ventilator and battery backup.

You will need to give us 8 weeks' notice to arrange this.
