Corneal Donation – Your Questions Answered


Why should you donate?

A corneal transplant (graft) is a wonderful gift which can help restore sight to someone who has been blinded by corneal damage or disease. It may enable them to see again or may relieve severe eye pain. Sometimes, a successful transplant can restore independence to a housebound person.

Tragically the demand for corneal grafts is steadily increasing and far outnumbers the supply.


What is the cornea?

The cornea is the clear window in front of the iris (the coloured part of the eye). It must be transparent for normal sight. However, it is very delicate and can easily be damaged by injury or disease.



What is a cornea transplant?

The abnormal cornea is removed and replaced by the donor cornea. It is kept in place with very thin stitches. These stitches are almost invisible. The transplant does not change the colour of the eye.



Is transplantation successful?

Using modem surgical methods and drugs to control rejection, corneal transplantation is very successful. In most cases, more than 90% work.

Who will benefit from a corneal transplant?

People ranging from the very young to the very old receive corneal transplants. Even tiny children sometimes require a transplant!

Why is it necessary to remove the whole eye?

There is a high risk of spreading infection to the cornea as it is removed and of causing damage to its delicate surfaces It is much safer to remove the whole eye first and then remove the cornea in a special room with special instruments.

What will happen to the rest of the eye?

Other parts of the eye can also be used in other types of transplant operations.

Any part not used for surgery can be used for research by scientists in our internationally renowned laboratories Valuable information from even a normal eye can be used to help us in the battle to prevent blindness. None of the eye tissue will be wasted.

Can anyone donate their eyes?

There are very few people who cannot be donors. Unlike most other organs, such as kidneys and hearts, the corneas can be donated long after death (up to 24 hours).

Should donors have perfect sight?

No. Wearing glasses is not a reason not to be a corneal donor.

When will the eyes be collected?

The eyes can be retrieved anytime within the first 24 hours of death. Specially trained people can carry the retrieval out anywhere. It does not have to be done in an operating theatre.

Will there be any facial disfigurement?

No. Cosmetically there will be no change. The eyelids will be closed.

What happens to the eyes after they have been removed?

The corneas will be stored in a special fluid, which keeps them healthy in an eye bank for up to 30 days until they are required.

How can a donation be made?

You can register to be a corneal donor whilst you are still alive. You can obtain registration forms from doctors' surgeries, chemists or libraries or by telephoning free of charge on 0800 555 777. The Corneal Nurse at the Royal Liverpool University Hospital can answer any questions you may have.
